Topic: Media & Foreign Policy

Briefing Book Author: Susan Moeller



Today state and non-state actors maneuver a complex, rapidly evolving media landscape. Conventional journalism competes with user-generated content, and official communication channels are circumvented through social media. As foreign policy is tweeted from the White House, “fake news” is entering the zeitgeist, with misinformation posing complex security threats.

Dr. Ulf Jonas Björk, Chair, Journalism Department, Indiana University-Purdue University, Indianapolis teaches media history, communication law, international mass media and writing. He has taught journalism at Stockholm University, the Midwestern State University, Wichita Falls, TX; and since 1988, IUPUI. As a Fulbright Fellow in 2012, he taught U.S. Mass Media at Uppsala University in his native Sweden. His research interests include foreign correspondence in U.S. newspapers in a historical perspective.

Dr. Margaretha Geertsema-Sligh, Professor of Journalism, Butler University, was born and raised in South Africa. Areas of emphasis included media sociology, international communication and media, and cultural gender studies. She teaches Global Media, Gender and News, and Media Writing, and was a Desmond Tutu Fellow in 2013 and 2014. For study abroad, she has taken Butler students to South Africa. Publications include articles on media and activism in South Africa, and bringing women’s history into a core curriculum.

Dr. Robert Einterz, professor of clinical medicine, Associate Dean, Global Health, Indiana University, is also director of AMPATH. (Academic Model Providing Access to Healthcare.), serving more than three million people in Kenya. He directed a primary health care program in rural Haiti, 1986-87. In 1989, he co-founded a partnership between Indiana University and Moi University, Kenya. In addition, he has worked with the Gates Foundation and POPFAR (President’s Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief.)

Topic: Turkey: A Partner in Crisis

Of all NATO allies, Turkey represents the most daunting challenge for the Trump administration. After a failed military coup in July 2016, the autocratic trend strengthened and the population considers the U.S. a security threat. In the context of a “clash of civilizations,” is Turkey’s geo-strategic position as the world’s most institutionally westernized Muslim country.

Dr. Tijen Demirel-Pegg, Assistant Professor, Political Science and Global and International Studies, Indiana University-Purdue University, received her BA and MA degrees in Ankara, Turkey. Indiana University awarded her PhD, Political Science, 2011. Her major fields are international relations and comparative politics, and her minor fields are social science and data analysis. At IUPUI, she teaches Middle Eastern politics, political violence, and human rights. She has presented a paper on Istanbul’s 2013 Gezi Park Protests.

Topic: Waning of Pax Americana?

Briefing Book Author: Carla Norrlof



With Donald Trump’s presidency, the U.S. has begun an historic shift away from Pax Americana, the established liberal international order since World War II’s end in 1945. Pax Americana has promised peaceful international relations with an open economy, buttressed by U.S. military power. “American First” isolationism, shifts the political mood towards selective U.S. engagement.

Presenter: John Clark, PhD, Director, Development, Center for Interfaith Cooperation



Dr. John Clark is Director of Development and Communication at the Center for Interfaith Cooperation. As an adjunct professor, Indiana University’s School for Public and Environmental Affairs, he teaches graduate courses on topics, such as: leading and governing in a global society, grant writing and management, and social entrepreneurship. He has authored more than a hundred books, articles and reports on topics, such as: the collapse of communism, environmental policy, and immigration in Indiana.

Topic: Russia’s Foreign Policy

Under President Vladimir Putin, Russia projects an autocratic governance model abroad and works to destabilize liberal democracies. In 2016, Russia caused an international uproar when it interfered in the U.S. presidential contest. Putin’s foreign policies include other instruments, from alliances with autocrats to proxy wars with the U.S. in Georgia, Ukraine and Syria.

Presenter: Ed Delaney, JD, Indiana House of Representatives



Ed Delaney serves in the Indiana House of Representatives, having retired from Barnes and Thornberg and subsequently from Delaney & Delaney. In the course of his studies, he became fluent in the Russian language. He represented the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina in an arbitration hearing under the Dayton Peace Accords; and has served as an election monitor for the International Republican Institute in Russia. He was the founding lawyer of Investigative Reporters and Editors, Inc .

Topic: U.S. Global Engagement & the Military

At this turning point for U.S. global engagement with a military role, some argue an “America First” paradigm, with a large military to match, while others envision a more traditional assertion of U.S. multilateral leadership. Still others favor greater restraint and cautious cooperation. The role of U.S. military force, arms sales, and security assistance, in the shifting international system, will be considered.

Presenter: Pierre Atlas, PhD, Professor, Political Science, Marian University



Dr. Pierre Atlas, is a professor of political science at Marian University. While serving in the U.S. Army in the 1980’s, he studied Arabic. As a comparative political scientist, he devotes much of his career to studying and writing articles and book reviews about the Middle East, and has presented numerous conference papers on Middle East politics. Among courses he teaches are Politics of the Middle East, Civil Wars and Ethnic Conflicts, American Foreign Policy, and Politics of the Global Economy.

While China has implemented an expansive strategy of economic diplomacy in the Asia-Pacific region and beyond, the U.S. has taken a step back from multilateral trade agreements and discarded the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP). China has made inroads through initiatives like One Belt, One Road and the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB).
