Ambassador Lee Feinstein, Founding Dean and Professor, School of Global and International Studies, [SGIS], Indiana University, will discuss the American diplomatic relations with other countries.

A noted scholar- practitioner, his authoritative writings address interventions towards peace keeping and express "the responsibility to protect" as well as what is needed to prevent mass atrocities.

He has served as U.S. Ambassador to Poland, on the Secretary of State's Policy Planning Staff, and holds a number of board positions, including a presidential appointment to the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum.

Liesl Riddle, PhD, Associate Professor of International Business and International Affairs at George Washington University, has researched and written about 16 different diaspora communities in the USA and Europe who originate from Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, Latin America, and the Middle East.

She is a frequent guest speaker at the U.S. Foreign Service Institute where she engages in briefing diplomats.

Dr. Riddle will profile how refugee immigrant groups, although borne of tragedy and settled in the U.S., make incalculable economic, cultural, professional, medical, and social contributions to the whole of America.
