Ambassador Lee Feinstein will be addressing the Indiana Council on World Affairs on Thursday, April 19, 2018. His remarks, "Diplomacy: Keeping Peace & Preventing Atrocities" will amplify how diplomacy offers our "best chance" of providing peaceful means for averting war and the brutal mass atrocities too often associated with war.

Having served as U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of Poland [2009-2012], Feinstein has been honored by Poland for strengthening Polish-American cooperation. He has served in both the U.S. Offices of the Secretary of State and the Secretary of Defense, and has worked in research institutes, including the Council on Foreign Relations and the Brookings Institution.

A scholar, international lawyer, and human rights expert, he has authored, with Tod Lindberg, *Means to an End: U.S. Interest and the International Criminal Court*. His authoritative writings express "the responsibility to protect" and his Council on Foreign Relations Special Report, "Darfur and Beyond: What is Needed to Prevent Mass Atrocities" is available on Amazon.



Indiana University's School of Global and International Studies [SGIS] approved by the IU Trustees in August, 2012, is located in the new state-of-the-art building, dedicated in 2015. SGIS is propelling its academic accomplishments and influence to exceed nearly every other international studies program in the country.

Feinstein graduated from Georgetown University Law Center, earned a master's degree in political science from the City University of New York, and a bachelor's degree from Vassar College. He holds board positions, including a presidential appointment to the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum where he is on the Executive Council.
